CBS CHARLEVILLE STUDENTS STUN WITH AMAZING RESULTS

There was huge success this year in CBS Charleville with the Leaving Certificate results. 11% of students achieved over 600 points, 32% achieved over 500 points and 50% achieved over 400 points. There was an astounding 32% of students who achieved a H1 in maths while 100% of Higher Level maths students received the 25 bonus points. While all the results were excellent, one student, Darragh O'Sullivan, received the maximum 625 points which is an amazing achievement. The class of 2022 went through a very challenging time during their Senior Cycle education with two lock downs due to Covid-19 along with plenty of restrictions. They managed to overcome these challenges with their hard work and determination, but also with the support of the staff who were always on hand to provide extra support and advice when needed. On Thursday 8th September the students received their first round of CAO offers and there were plenty of happy faces.

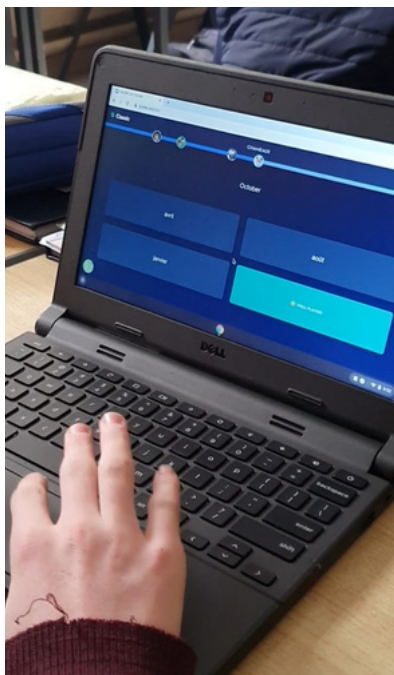
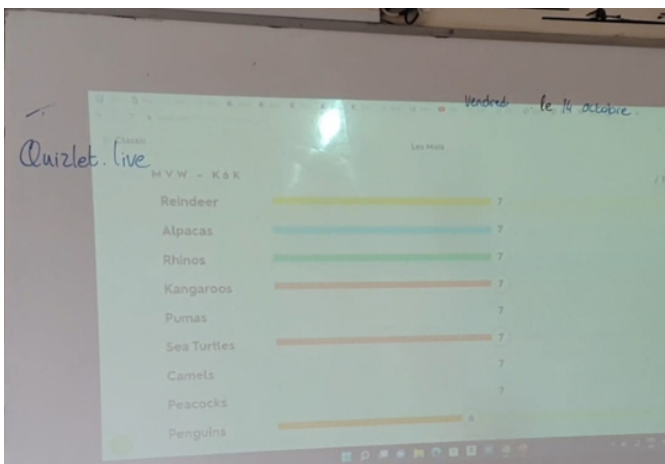
TECHNOLOGY IN THE FRENCH CLASSROOM

Students have also been enjoying many in class competitions using their phones and chromebooks working both individually and as a team.

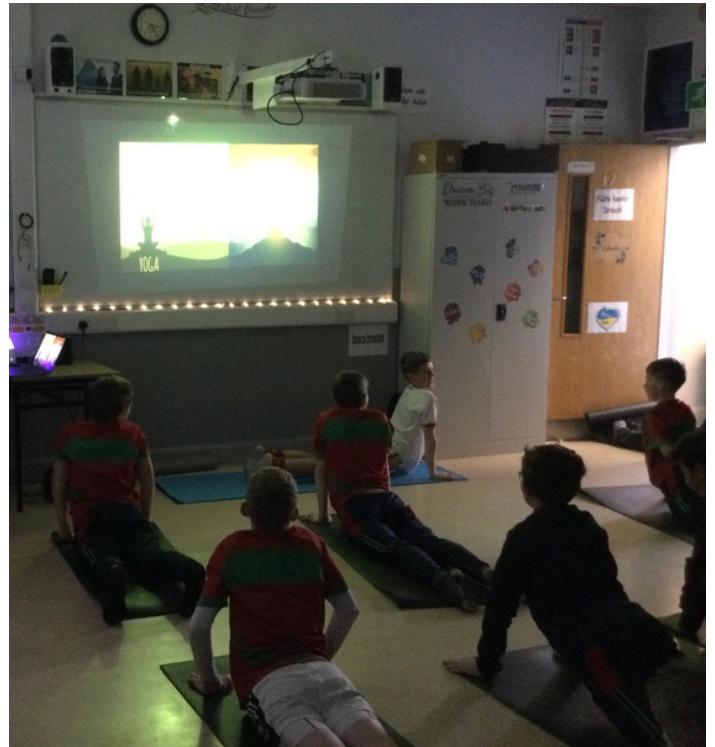


YOGA INTRODUCED FOR JUNIOR CYCLE WELLBEING

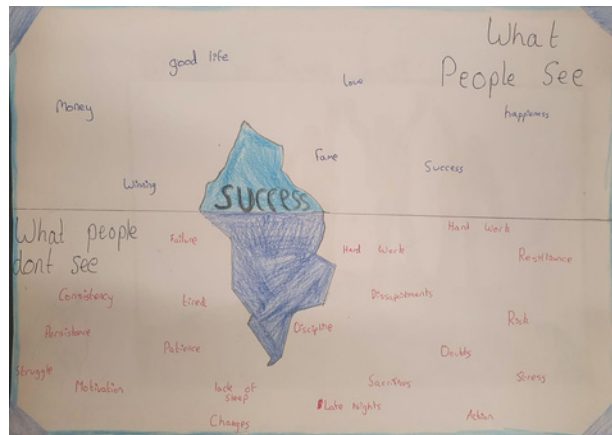

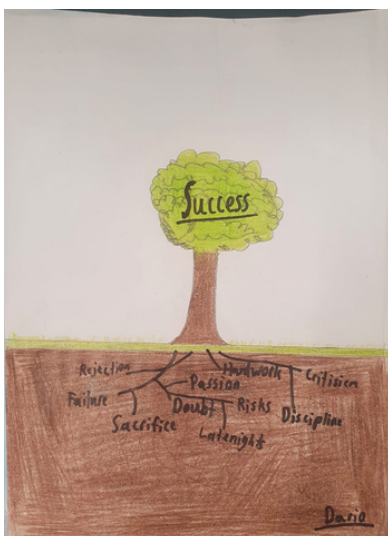

FOOTBALL FOR ALL

After a two-year absence due to Covid-19, the FAI run programme, *Football for All* is back at Holy Family School, based on the St Joseph's Foundation campus.

Our unique FAI programme offers an outlet for children with special needs to play football with their fellow students from the two secondary school's TY programmes in Charleville town.

Back in 2011, Charleville AFC approached the Holy Family School, the CBS and St. Mary's Secondary schools and asked if they would like to participate in FFA. Without hesitation all three schools came on board and so our journey began.

Every week a group of transition year students come to the Holy Family School to coach two different age groups. The first session is an hour long and the second session with the younger children is 30 minutes. Under direct supervision by a FFA local club member, the TY students prepare and implement a session plan. The TY students learn to adapt their session plans to the individual needs of the children they coach. As coaches, the TY students learn that they need to be flexible and open.

The second session with the younger children is less structured and the TY students teach skills such as turn taking with a football.

This programme is important for many reasons, not least the invaluable connections created by bringing the local schools together, demonstrating the importance of social inclusion in action.

The programme has been running successfully and its success wouldn't be possible without the fantastic support we get from all the staff in the Holy Family School, the CBS TY co-ordinator, Mary Mulroe and the St. Mary's TY co-ordinator Yvonne O'Keeffe.

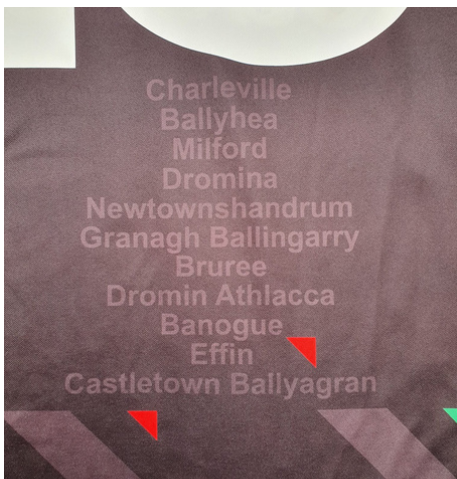


GRIFFINS COACHES SPONSOR SENIOR HURLERS
